July 6, 2021

A Regular Work Session of the Danville City Council convened on July 6, 2021 at 8:17 p.m. in the Council Chambers located on the Fourth Floor of the Municipal Building. Council Members present were: James B. Buckner, L.G. "Larry" Campbell Jr., Bryant Hood, Mayor Alonzo Jones, Barry P. Mayo, Vice Mayor Gary P. Miller, Sherman M. Saunders, J. Lee Vogler, Jr. and Madison J.R. Whittle (9).

Staff Members present were: City Manager Ken Larking, Deputy City Manager Earl B. Reynolds, Jr., City Attorney W. Clarke Whitfield Jr. and City Clerk Susan M. DeMasi.

Mayor Alonzo L. Jones presided.

MINUTES

Upon **Motion** by Council Member Buckner and second by Council Member Mayo, Minutes of the Regular Work Session held on June 1, 2021 were approved as presented. Draft copies were distributed to Council Members prior to the Meeting.

WORK SESSION ITEMS

CONSIDERATION OF THE PURCHASE OF PROPERTY FOR THE EXPANSION OF THE WEST FORK SUBSTATION

Director of Utilities Jason Grey explained AEP was building a substation in that area as well as the City upgrading their substation, so they will need the property for this upgrade and expansion.

Council Members agreed to put this on a business agenda.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

Director of Economic Development Corrie Bobe noted the Governor issued a press release that the City was to receive \$500,000 from the Virginia Brownfields Restoration and Economic Redevelopment Assistance Fund, or VBAF. This money will go towards the remediation of lead-based paint in the White Mill. Ms. Bobe explained several years ago, the City engaged a group called Cardno to seek out and apply for Brownfield grants on the City's behalf. They were the City's official Brownfield's consultant and their fees were based on the grants they secure.

Ms. Bobe stated at the August 5th business meeting, there will be an item on the agenda related to appropriating incentive funds for MEP which was announced several weeks ago; the City will be appropriating funds for the Commonwealth Opportunity Fund Loan and a Tobacco Region Opportunity Fund grant. There will be an additional item appropriating funds from the Tobacco Commission for Kyocera, an older grant that the City needs to appropriate the funds for.

COMMUNICATIONS

Mr. Vogler questioned the status of the commercial revitalization zones project. Mr. Larking explained the intern from Longwood University has been working with the City for the past few months. She has done very efficient work in inventorying areas of the City, whether they were vacant or not vacant, their condition and a variety of other factors, and she worked with Economic Development to produce a report. They were now taking that data and looking at what they can do next as far as implementing some strategies to help some of the less desirable commercial areas. Ms. Bobe noted that report will be discussed at the August work session.

SUMMARY

At the request of City Council, the Parks and Recreation Department is designing two splash pads, one for the northern part of the City and one for the southern part of the City, to be constructed during the Winter /Spring of 2022.

BACKGROUND

A splash pad or spray pool is a recreation area, often in a public park, for water play that has little or no standing water. This is said to eliminate the need for lifeguards or other supervision, as there is little risk of drowning.

Typically, there are ground nozzles that spray water upwards out of the splash pad's raindeck. There may also be other water features such as a rainbow (semicircular pipe shower), or mushroom- or tree-shaped showers. Some splash pads feature movable nozzles similar to those found on fire trucks to allow users to spray others. The showers and ground nozzles are often controlled by a hand activated-motion sensor, to run for limited time. The water is either freshwater, or recycled and treated water, that is typically treated to at least the same level of quality as swimming pool water standards. These splash pads are often surfaced in textured non-slip concrete or in crumb rubber.

Parks and Recreation has used a process to not only determine where to put these Splash Pads but also how to use this unique opportunity to make significant impact to the locations in these neighborhoods. In other words, what other amenities can be added around the Splash Pad to increase the impact and meet the needs of the residents that have been expressed.

Parks and Recreation considers several factors to best determine the improvements and investments in neighborhood parks and facilities. These factors broadly include:

Need which looks at the volume and variety of use of the park, Community input and the potential to make significant improvement to the space through investment. It also considers the need to provide quality public green space which is directly related to health.

Opportunity is the feasibility of the project. It looks at the ability to construct and maintain, considers how this investment fits into other projects in the city, and again the social, environment and economic impact for residents is considered.

Through public input and working with our community partners (DRF - Opportunity Neighborhoods, Community Development, and The Health Collaborative) it has been determined that Third Avenue is a very good location for the Splash Pad in the northern part of the City. By making the investment in this location, it opens up opportunities for future improvements such as a walking track and picnic shelter that have been requested by the community.

A location for the Southern Splash Pad has not yet been confirmed. Staff will present different options in the work session.
